


Of Women and Salt by Gabriela Garcia

Jeanette is battling addiction. Determined to understand her family history, she travels to Cuba to see her grandmother and reckon with secrets from the past destined to erupt.




My Broken Language by Quiara Alegria Hudes

The Hacienda by Isabel Cañas




A Ballad of Love and Glory by Reyna Grande


The Man Who **Could Move Clouds** by Ingrid Rojas Contreras


This memoir tracks a woman who grew up in a magical Columbian family amid political violence.
